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**Statutory Proposal to establish a new ASD Additionally Resourced Provision at  
Caterham High School**

Notice is given in accordance with section 19(1) of the Education and Inspections Act 2006, as amended by the Education Act 2011, and the School Organisation (Prescribed Alterations to Maintained Schools) (England) Regulations 2013 that the London Borough of Redbridge intends to make a prescribed alteration to Caterham High School, Caterham Avenue, Clayhall, Ilford, Essex, IG5 0QW, with effect from 1 September 2022.

A public consultation event will be held at Caterham High School at 18:00 on Tuesday 21 September 2021. All interested parties are welcome to attend this event, where presentations by London Borough of Redbridge staff will be followed by the opportunity to ask questions and/or provide direct feedback.

**Description of alteration and evidence of demand**

The London Borough of Redbridge is proposing to establish an Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) Additionally Resourced Provision (ARP) at Caterham High School for 28 additional pupils with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP), across Year 7 to Year 13 (4 places in each year group). Admission to this facility will be distinct from mainstream admission to the main school. As such, future arrangements for admissions to mainstream Year 7 places at the school will not be altered by this proposal.

This proposal has been formed in response to a growing demand for such places in the local area. In line with regional and national trends, the London Borough of Redbridge has recently been experiencing substantial growth in demand for places in specialist education provision. As far back as 2015, Redbridge identified growth in the number of pupils presenting with different forms of Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), which accelerated over the following years. For example, between 2018 and 2020, the total number of school-age pupils with registered SEND rose by 13.6%. This trend is projected to continue over the course of the current seven-year planning horizon, with this being particularly driven by a rapid increase in specific areas of identified need. Thus, by the 2027/28 academic year, there is forecast to be a 21.9% increase in the number of pupils with EHCPs in Redbridge, with a corresponding increase of 26.5% in the number of such pupils with ASD as a primary need type. Naturally, such pupil growth has resulted in the need for additional provision to accommodate the shifting profile of need, which has only partially been achievable within the bounds of the existing infrastructure.

As a consequence of this rising demand, the London Borough of Redbridge undertook a High Needs Review, which recommended the creation of 140 new school places for pupils with SEND, over the period 2018-2023. This was underpinned by an aspiration to create a significant amount of these places in Additionally Resourced Provisions attached to mainstream schools. This element of the proposals, in particular, generated strong support from parents, when consultation on the Review's proposals was undertaken in July 2018. Parents welcomed the proposed increase in the range of options available, with an emphasis on access to a mainstream curriculum, in the context of appropriate specialist support.

The current proposal, therefore, forms part of a borough-wide expansion programme, aimed at providing sufficient SEND school places to meet the current and projected future levels of demand, delivered across both specialist and mainstream settings. If approved, this proposal would provide 28 additional secondary places within Redbridge, which would help to bridge the gap between the supply of and demand for school places. It is also worth noting that this proposal directly compliments the creation of 28 primary places in 2019, even split across Cranbrook Primary School and Mayespark Primary School.

### **Objectives:**

The proposed delivery of an ASD ARP at Caterham High School has the following objectives at its core:

1. To support the London Borough of Redbridge in delivering against its role in providing sufficient school places to meet local demand. These 28 additional ASD places will meet the needs of a key SEND growth area.
2. To broaden the Local Offer by providing more opportunity for children with SEND to attend a mainstream school with support, where appropriate. This will also augment the inclusivity agenda and, in enabling a more tailored offer to local pupils, potentially improve educational outcomes as well.
3. To promote parental preference, which (as set out above) clearly supports the expansion of SEND provision in mainstream settings.

### **Effect on other Educational Institutions**

As mentioned above, there is an increasing demand for ASD ARP places within Redbridge. As this will be providing mainstream alternatives for SEND pupils, it is not anticipated that the provision will have a significant impact on other mainstream institutions within the local area. Rather, if implemented, it is expected that the proposed new provision would relieve some of the pressure on places currently faced by Little Heath Special School.

### **Project Costs**

The creation of the accommodation for the proposed ARP requires investment in converting the old caretaker's house at the school into a five-classroom dedicated resource base. The anticipated cost of the associated capital project is £450,000. The project cost will be funded through the London Borough of Redbridge's Special Provision Capital Fund, which is a capital grant allocation provided by the DfE specifically to finance the expansion of SEND provision.

The investment of this capital will support long-term value for money, by providing a broader range of appropriately resourced, local SEND provision for the Borough's pupils, thereby reducing the need to unduly rely on more costly placements out-of-Borough and/or in the non-maintained sector.

### **Implementation Plan**

The London Borough of Redbridge has complied with all applicable statutory requirements in connection with this proposal. At the conclusion of the notice period, if permission is granted by the Cabinet, the London Borough of Redbridge will implement the proposal.

If approved, the plan is to formally open the new facility in September 2022. In the first year four places will be offered in Year 7 and four in Year 12. Thereafter, the provision will grow incrementally, year-on-year, with four additional places being offered in each subsequent Year 7 and Year 12 intake, with the total capacity of 28 places expected to be reached in September 2026. Admission will be by agreement with the Special Educational Needs Team of Redbridge Council. All children who are offered places will have, or be about to receive, an Education, Health and Care Plan.
